God Loves You This Much - "Eight Days A Week!"

"Eight Days A Week" was a moldy oldy song of decades ago made famous by the Beatles. It was a song vowing love for the singer's beloved eight days a week, which meant he would always show love to his beloved. We might describe God's love as eternal by saying His love too is eight days a week. And, surprisingly it begins with a Jewish religious rite called circumcision. Eight days after Jesus was born, He was circumcised and named. It just so happens that this day falls on the same day that America celebrates as New Year's Day. Ironically, these two days have a few similarities. No, there wasn't a parade when Jesus was circumcised. There were no college bowl games on the plains of Jerusalem. But nonetheless, there are a few similarities.

It was the completion of something old. Usually when a new year begins, people will like to show the highlights from the year before. Just recently the news media made their judgments on what they thought were the most memorable events of 2017. In a sense, these wrap ups serve to close the book on the old year. You pay your final respects to the events of 2017, and you move on.

In a similar sense, when Jesus was circumcised on the eighth day, God was closing the book on something old. Only God wasn't closing the book on something that was done for only a year. God was putting a stop to something that was done for approximately 1500 years. He fulfilled the promise of a Savior that was given long ago through the covenant of circumcision. Since Jesus fulfilled this covenant, it was no longer needed. Jesus fulfilled a law when He was circumcised, and therefore He got rid of it. Jesus did what He came for - he obeyed God's laws for us. When Jesus fulfilled this law, He abolished it. Jesus circumcision was beginning the blood redemption - buying back our souls.

At his circumcision Jesus' blood was shed. This circumcision was marking the beginning of Jesus' suffering, pointing ahead to the punishment that Jesus would take on the cross for the sins of the world.

So as we celebrate and look back at the accomplishments and events of 2017, the greatest accomplishment we can also celebrate is the fact that Jesus got rid of God's wrath hanging over our heads. Even though we have sinned and deserve God's wrath many times in 2017, we know that Jesus was already punished for us. Even though God demands that we obey His Ten Commandments perfectly, we know that Jesus already did this for us.

The Eighth Day was like New Year's Day -It was the beginning of something new. The nice thing about a new year is that it brings new hope. 2017 is officially over. You can put aside the past mistakes, the past failures, and have a mind set to start a new year and turn over a new slate in 2018.

Just as the new year brings new hope, so on the eighth day there was a new hope. In this way, the eighth day was like New Year's Day. It brought something new. How? Instead of living by promises of things to come, the people could live by realities things that came to pass. Why? Jesus was given His name. When a new name is given, it means that there is a beginning of something new.

The name Jesus means, "the Lord saves." Notice it doesn't mean, "the Lord helps people save themselves." It means, "the LORD saves." Jesus would be the Savior of the world. Our salvation wouldn't have anything to do with what we would do. It would only depend on the Lord.

Through faith in Christ, we are now living in the reality of things just hoped for in previous ages. Therefore have a new lease on life. Just as God gave Jesus His name, so He has given us new names. Instead of calling us filthy and damned sinners, names that we have earned, He now calls us "saints", a name that Jesus has earned for us. This is what we are now. Through faith in Jesus Christ, we take on a new name. We're called Christians, saints, and holy people. It gives us a fresh start. It's a present reality. It's like we have been broken free from the chains that were bound around our neck. The devil can no longer accuse us of sin. God's wrath can no longer touch us, for we know that God already punished Christ for us. We are now holy in God's sight.





All because of what happened on the eighth day we can face 2018 with confidence and hope. Things changed on that day. With the circumcision and naming of Jesus, God fulfilled the law and began suffering for our sins. At our baptism, God circumcised our hearts and connected us to Christ - giving us His Name and reputation. That's what gives us hope and courage for the future - to face another year. This is why we celebrate eight days a week the eighth day. It's like New Year's Day - giving us a new lease on life.

Welcome to 2018! My time here during 2017 marks the end of the first half of internship! In my time of writing this article and reflecting on my first six months here at Holy Cross, I thought I would review some of the steps I have taken so far! So...without further ado, here is the year in review:

July: Arrival at Holy Cross Church. I began to do Kids messages every other week, meet members, and attend meetings. Meeting all of you was so much fun, and I look back on those memories fondly.

August: Kids messages began happening every single week! I started to draft up new ways to minister to those inside and outside the church. Over time my relationships with all of you grew so much!

September: We started our Joining Jesus Missional Community, a small group of people dedicated to growing as God's neighborhood missionaries. The class met every week for ten weeks! Sunday School started again, I also attended a Church Workers Conference for the SELC in Pennsylvania, where I familiarized myself with several of the key influential leaders of our district.

October: Leading worship and preaching were some of my favorite moments from the past six months! October was also busy with the continuation of Joining Jesus meetings and the drafting of even more ministry opportunities down the road. David Thiele also held a conference designed to help us understand how we can minister to our own demographics with his MissionInsite presentation. The month ended with Halloween and our annual trunk or treat, with an added scavenger hunt in order to help our guests, both children and parents, further engage with our church members!

November: Peter Meier, an expert on local missions, came and used our space to host a Mobilizing the Mission conference. He helped our congregation ask critical and important questions about who we are at our core, our values, and what our dreams and plans might be for the future of Holy Cross. The next week my University supervisor from Texas, Doctor Jacob Youmans, also visited. He was instrumental in processing my time thus far with the church, and for casting a vision as to what the next seven months could look like.

I also began meeting regularly with some of the younger people of our church. While this is not a formal youth gathering, myself and a few other young adults met every other week to play board games, talk about life, and enjoy fellowship. I also took a longer vacation to see my family for Thanksgiving. I returned from the break energized to be back, and began spending more time out of the office, meeting others in the community and trying to schedule meetings with some of our city officials.

December: Advent is an exciting, yet challenging time for church workers. I loved getting to spend some Holiday time with good people from church, and I also have enjoyed learning the Holiday traditions around these parts. During Holiday on Pulaski we handed out special Life Books, small booklets that contain the gospel of John with annotations from teenagers. These books are meant as a way to connect the gospel to younger kids in our community, and I look forward to handing out even more in the future. Pastor and myself also met with the Mayor of Alsip, to discover how we can best serve our fine village! An outreach initiative called Coffee for Commuters was planned and executed by the Board of Evangelism; we handed out 130-140 cups of coffee to people during their morning commute to work on 127th and Pulaski. Each coffee cup was decorated with an invitation to our Christmas Church Services, as well as Christmas greetings. The following day we had a special Christmas party for young kids. We had over a dozen show up, and I led games and read from the Bible in order to teach them the true Christmas story.

I cannot wait to see how else God uses our church in between the time of me writing this article and its publication!

STEWARDSHIP 2018

It's a new year. It's a time when we take stock of the year past in order to improve the year to come. It's a time when we sit down to plan and implement what we want to accomplish and even change. Part of that is planning our stewardship for the coming year.

Often we find this difficult and daunting and even joyless. But it doesn't have to be. In fact, it is really quite simple and full of joy. So here are some tips to make that planning less stressful. You begin by answering these three questions: Who are you? To whom do I give? And how much?

So, who are you? The Table of Duties in the Small Catechism informs us. Are you a hearer of God's Word? Are you a citizen of society? Are you a member of a family? Stewardship covers these three estates: church, society, family. We don't particularly struggle to give to society or family. Our struggles, our difficulties and our questions arise in giving to the church.

So, what is our duty as members of the church with regard to giving? The Table of Duties, again, gives us a guide. If you are a hearer, a member of the church who receives instruction, St. Paul taught: "Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor" (Gal. 6:6). This means the local congregation is primary.

Your pastor is the one called to preach the Gospel to you and administer the Lord's blessed sacraments to you. Your congregation is the place where those things happen. Thus, when God calls us to give to the church, He has the local congregation in mind. For "the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14).

How much do we give to the local congregation? Our only instructions are these: to give regularly (1 Cor. 6:1-2), proportionally (1 Cor. 16:1-2; 2 Cor. 8:12), and generously (2 Cor. 8:20) of our first fruits (Gen. 4:4; Prov. 3:9; Lev. 27:30) with a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor. 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor. 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor. 9:7), and love (2 Cor. 8:23).


In other words, giving to the church is not to be an afterthought, given after everything else is spent. In this way, it is deliberate. We give regularly - weekly, bi-weekly, monthly, quarterly, or yearly - keeping in mind our own strengths, weaknesses, and limitations. We set it aside beforehand - before anything else is spent.

From those first fruits, we set aside a proportionate and generous amount. Ten percent was the standard for the Israelites. This was a command for the ancient Israelites. We can give as much as we want, but ask yourself: do we really want to be less generous than was commanded of the Israelites? Is the job of the New Testament Church bigger or smaller than the job given to Israel?

And how are we to give it? We give it with eagerness and earnestness. We give it cheerfully and with love, not out of compulsion. For through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, God has made us His children, forgiven us all our sins, given us grace upon grace, promised us life ever-lasting with Him in His kingdom, and filled us with His own Spirit, the Holy Spirit. This makes giving a joy, as Jesus said, "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

It's that easy. And it is joyful. For in stewardship, our gracious and giving Lord invites us to take part in the work that He accomplishes here on earth, providing for the ongoing preaching of the gospel as well as those who are in need. Taking part in that makes all our work holy - work that is done in service to the Lord as priestly members of His kingdom.





Nutritious Meals Delivered to Seniors' Homes PLOWS Council on Aging's Home Delivered Meals (HDM) can provide the nutrition necessary for seniors to remain healthy and independent. Seniors, age 60 and over, who have difficulty preparing nourishing meals or grocery shopping may be eligible for the HDM program. Meals are delivered by trusted volunteers Monday through Friday in the morning. Meal delivery also serves as a wellbeing check for homebound seniors. There is a suggested donation for meals, but seniors will not be terminated if the client is unable to meet that contribution. Requesting meals is as simple as calling PLOWS at 708-361-0219. Our intake case-

worker can explain the process and get it started. The PLOWS Council on Aging is a 501(c)3 organization serving seniors and their families throughout suburban Cook County in Palos, Lemont, Orland, and Worth Townships. Those living outside the PLOWS area can find their agency by calling the Illinois Senior Help Line at 1-800-252-8966.

<u>HOLY CROSS VOTERS' MEETING</u> will be held January 14 at noon. The 2018 budget will be finalized, membership matters will be discussed and nominations for District officers and boards will be determined. Members of Holy Cross ages 18 and older are welcome to attend and help us make decisions good for the ministry of Holy Cross.

<u>WORSHIP FOR SHUT-INS</u> is a 30-minute traditional Lutheran worship service, broadcast weekly to nourish the souls of those who cannot attend church in a traditional setting. It is broadcast on TV for Chicago, Northwest Indiana (includes Rockford, Central Illinois & Southwest Michigan) Sunday 11:30 am - Comcast 138 (Total Living).



The Fruit of the Spirit will be the theme for six Sundays beginning January 7. Both our sermons and Sunday Bible studies will explore how to avoid sin and live by the Spirit. Only hours before Jesus was arrested, He delivered an important message to His disciples (John 14–16). At the heart of this message He describes the "fruit" His disciples would bear, the works they would do to glorify the heavenly Father. Through the gift of the Spirit, Jesus promised love (John 14:21), joy (15:11), and peace (14:27) to them and to you. However, many Christian families and congregations lack the love, joy, and peace Jesus described. Selfishness, pride, and abusive behavior arise all to easily for us. Sin is truly second nature

to human beings, even to the people of God. This sermon/Bible study series will help you produce the fruit God calls you to bear as a believer. Through biblical examples and teaching from both the Old and New Testaments, you will explore God's goodness and blessings for you in Christ. You will learn to crucify "the sinful nature with its passions and desires" and "live by the Spirit" (Galatians 5:24, 25).

<u>ADULT INSTRUCTION CLASS</u> will be beginning January 3 at 7 p.m. and will meet weekly. If you would be interested in attending, even if it's just as a refresher course in basic Christian beliefs and life you are welcome.

TAX CREDIT SCHOLARSHIPS FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION now availa-

ble. The House and Senate passed a comprehensive education funding bill this past August (2017) that was signed into law by the governor. The law includes a provision for tax credit scholarships – a 75 Percent income tax credit to individuals and businesses – supporting non-public school scholarships for low-income students in the state. Illinois students from low-income families may use these new scholarships to attend a non-public school of their choice.

The Invest for Kids tax credit scholarship program was created in Illinois to benefit children whose educational options are limited by household income. For low-income families living in the LCMS, this means that more children will have the opportunity to experience the love of Jesus Christ every school day while attending our Lutheran schools.

For our LCMS schools, this means that we have the greatest opportunity in our time to plan and act in alignment with God's calling in the Great Commission – to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ to our communities. The role of the school is that which extends the mission of the church in reaching New Believers through Jesus Christ. We have the opportunity to share the love of Jesus Christ to more children in our neighborhoods!

The Invest In Kids tax credit scholarship program allows our schools extend the opportunity to go beyond traditional boundaries, bringing hope to those families and children who could only dream of attending our Lutheran schools.

The LCMS Northern Illinois District, as well as the Central and Southern Districts, have partnered with Empower Illinois, a statewide Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) created in 2017 to serve Illinois children through the state's tax credit scholarship program. Empower Illinois connects Tax Credit Scholarship Donations to Illinois students whose education opportunities may be limited by household income.

Individuals and corporate donors may receive a credit for their Illinois state taxes equal to 75 percent of donations to an SGO. Individuals may direct their donations to qualified schools. A list of qualifying schools is available on the Empower Illinois website.
